

From internet access to *civic power*

BASAibu Wiki transforms young Indonesian women and men from passive digital users into genuine co-creators of the policies that shape their lives. We work at two levels: building civic confidence, digital literacy, and advocacy skills in individuals; and embedding youth-led participation into government structures so that young voices become a standard part of how decisions get made.

How civic change happens

We've been changing civic participation of Indonesian youth at the behavior and systems levels by changing norms, filling in gaps in the official youth public participation process, and developing the capacity of youth and government to more effectively dialogue with one another, supported by educators, community leaders and parents.



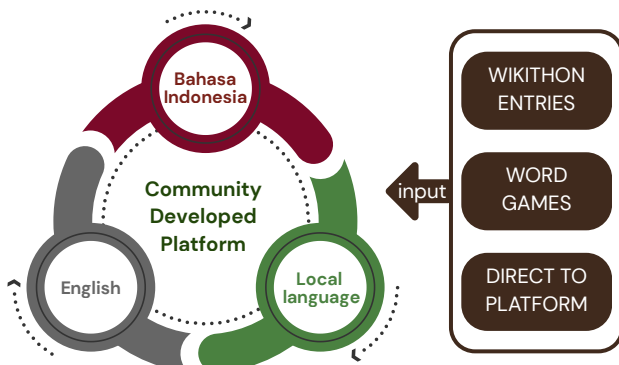
SCALE • WHO WE REACH

- 6M** Platform users since 2014 across all wiki provinces
- 153,505** Direct participants
60% of whom are young women
- 8** Institutions which have integrated BASAibu processes
- 3.6 → 4.3** Democratic efficacy score improvement*
*Pre-post test. Measured on a 5-point Likert scale across 9 items including "My opinion has been heard by policymakers" and "I feel able to influence others on social issues."
- 15⁺** Youth-generated proposals adopted into government programs

WHERE WE WORK

We currently work in 4 provinces: South Kalimantan, South Sulawesi, Bali, and West Nusa Tenggara. Java — launching 2026; expansion to Java adds 38–43 million youth and triples our addressable market.

CO-PRODUCED MULTILINGUAL DICTIONARIES



Validation:

1. National Language Agency of the Ministry of Education has encouraged schools to use the BASAibu dictionaries.
2. BASAibu dictionaries are officially part of the government's "Dictionaries in Schools" program in South Sulawesi.
3. Dictionaries have been referenced in several academic journals.
4. Validated by experts.

One platform per province, co-developed with the community and language experts in local languages, Indonesian and English, organized around local knowledge and expression.

IMPLEMENTED POLICIES THAT ORIGINATED FROM YOUTH PROPOSALS



South Sulawesi

- Mental health corners established at public events and in schools.
- Regional House of Representatives committed to elevating Youth Congress priorities into the Regional Medium-Term Development Plan.

Bali

- Single-use plastic prohibited in outdoor temples and prayer sites.
- Youth-led village cleaning programs institutionalized.
- Flyers promoting good tourist behavior are posted at tourist destinations.

West Nusa Tenggara

- Sexual harassment prevention training implemented in high schools.
- Young women led STOP Child Marriage campaigns in schools and local communities.

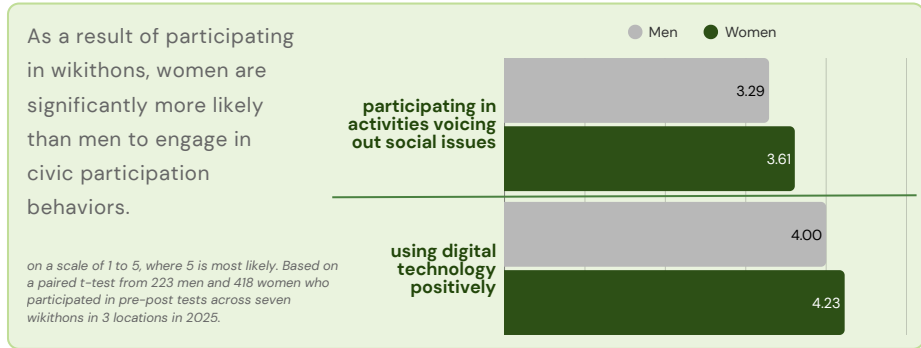
South Kalimantan

- High schools provided water bottles to students to decrease use of plastic.
- Schools adopted programs to encourage drop outs to return to school.

60% women — by design

In civic technology, 60% female participation is extraordinary — and it did not happen by accident. Our platforms are built in local languages, our wikithons train advocacy skills formal schooling rarely provides, and we actively track women's leadership at every level.
